Storyline

• Maryland tied for the regular-season championship in the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 13-3 record and, as the No. 2 seed, will play in the ACC Tournament quarterfinals on Friday at 7 p.m. against either No. 7-seed Georgia Tech or 10th-seeded North Carolina. The Terrapins won their only meetings of the season against each team.

• Senior guard Greivis Vasquez was named ACC Player of the Year on Tuesday, the first Terrapin to win the award since Juan Dixon captured the honor in 2002. Head coach Gary Williams was voted ACC Coach of the Year, his second such honor and the first since 2002. Balloting was conducted by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association.

• Vasquez has been named thus far to three All-America teams. FoxSports.com and Sporting News named him to their first team, with Yahoo Sports giving him a second-team nod. Vasquez is the first All-American for the Terps since Lonny Baxter and Juan Dixon earned those honors in 2002.

• Maryland will be attempting to win its first ACC Tournament title since 2004. In Greensboro that season, the 6th-seeded Terrapins defeated the Nos. 3, 2 and 1 seeds to roll to the championship. The Terrapins are the No. 2 seed in the tournament for the 10th time.

• Jordan Williams was voted onto the ACC All-Rookie Team, becoming the first Maryland freshman to earn that honor since Steve Blake was voted onto the squad in 2000.

Terps Among Decade's Best

Lindy's College Basketball preseason magazine hit the newsstands and has touted the University of Maryland men's basketball program in a number of ways.

The Terrapins are listed ninth among the decade's top programs by the magazine. The listing notes Maryland's national championship in 2002, as well as its 223-111 record during the decade.

Senior point guard Greivis Vasquez is listed on the Terps' All-Decade Team along with Lonny Baxter, Steve Blake, Nik Caner-Medley and Juan Dixon.

The Terps share "The Decade's Top 10 Programs" with Kansas, North Carolina, Michigan State, Duke, UConn, Florida, UCLA, Texas and Arizona.

Terps Beat the Best in 2008-09

Last season, Maryland was the only team in the nation to beat both North Carolina and Michigan State, the two finalists in the NCAA Championship Game in Detroit... The Terps beat Michigan State, 80-62, in the first round of the Old Spice Classic in Orlando, Fla., on Thanksgiving Night. The Terps added an 88-85 overtime win over then-No. 3 North Carolina on Feb. 21...

According to Stats, LLC, the Terps were the first team to beat both NCAA finalists in the same season since 2003-04 when UNC beat both Connecticut and Georgia Tech... Only three other teams toppled both finalists in the same season in the last 12 years... Stanford knocked off Duke and Arizona in 2000-01, while Purdue and Kentucky both defeated the title game participants in 1999-2000 (Michigan State and Florida).

Gary Williams' 21st Season

Williams earned the 2010 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year Award for the second time in his career in voting by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association. He last won in the 2002 national championship season.

Williams, who is 17-18 (.486) in ACC Tournament games, continues to roll up Hall of Fame-style numbers in terms of his 32-year career and the 21 years he's been directing basketball fortunes at his alma mater...

He is the 5th-winningest active head coach in NCAA Division I men's basketball with an overall record of 648-364 (.640)... The 1,000th game in his illustrious career was on Jan. 23 when the Terps played host to NC State...

He ranks 3rd all-time (2nd active) among coaches at ACC schools with 441 victories at Maryland, and also ranks 2nd among active league coaches with 202 ACC victories... Williams is the Terps' all-time winningest coach...

Maryland Among ACC's Best Last 5 Years

Maryland has been one of the top programs in the ACC over the past 10 seasons... Even following the Terps' appearances in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen from 2001 to 2003, Maryland has remained a force in the league:

- With 46 league wins, Maryland ranks behind only North Carolina and Duke in ACC victories over the past five years.
- Head coach Gary Williams ranks 2nd among active ACC coaches with 202 wins in regular-season and tournament games.
- The Terps captured the 2002 ACC regular-season title & the 2004 ACC Tourney championship.
- Maryland owns the league's best record in games against Duke and North Carolina over the past 11 seasons. The Terps are 22-29 in games against Duke and Carolina since the 1998-99 season... No other ACC team has more than 14 wins against the Blue Devils and Tar Heels in that time.

Maryland vs. Ranked Teams Under Gary Williams

Since Gary Williams took over in 1989-90, Maryland has 72 wins over Top 25 teams, including a 79-72 win over #4 Duke last week:

- Williams is the nation's winningest active coach vs. top-ranked teams with seven career victories over a No. 1 opponent (6 at Maryland; 1 at Ohio State).
- Under Williams, Maryland has defeated 20 Top 5 opponents, 34 Top 10 opponents and the No. 1 team 6 times.
- Maryland has 23 wins over Top 10 teams the last 10 years.
- The Terps have defeated at least one Top 10 opponent in 17 of 21 seasons under Williams, including 14 straight.
- Williams has led victories over 1st-, 2nd- or 3rd-ranked teams in 8 of the last 10 seasons.

Milestones, Streaks, Rankings, etc.

- Maryland has hit at least one 3-pointer in 385 consecutive games.
- The Terps are 69-7 in non-conference games in Comcast Center.
- MARYLAND HAS WON AT LEAST 19 GAMES IN 14 STRAIGHT SEASONS.
- The Terps have made 16 consecutive postseason appearances.
- Maryland's last losing season came in 1992-93, the last season of devastating NCAA sanctions levied against previous staffs at Maryland... Each school in the ACC has had a losing season since the Terps fell below .500 some 15 seasons ago... In fact, 9 of the 11 ACC opponents have suffered through a losing season since the Terps won the NCAA title in 2002... Duke and UNC are the exceptions.
- Landon Milbourne is 2 blocks away from becoming the 12th player in school history to record 100 in his career... Eric Hayes is 2 assists away from becoming the 6th player with 500.
- All five Maryland starters are among leaders in the Atlantic Coast Conference in one or more statistical categories.
- Maryland is shooting considerably better than it did in the 2008-09 season... The Terps are currently posting a .475 clip from the floor... A year ago, the Terrapins shot .424... Those two figures are .393 this year and .333 last year from behind the arc.
- Maryland has held 10 of its last 15 opponents under .400 shooting from the field... Maryland is 12th in the nation in field-goal percentage defense, one of four ACC teams in the top 12.
- Greivis Vasquez is now the 6th player in Maryland history to reach 2,000 career points... He is THE FIRST ACC PLAYER EVER TO RECORD 2,000 POINTS, 700 ASSISTS AND 600 REBOUNDS IN HIS CAREER, AND IS THE ONLY ACTIVE PLAYER IN THE NATION TO HAVE REACHED THOSE MILESTONES... Vasquez comes into the ACC Quarters with 2,112 points, 754 assists and 633 rebounds.
- This season, Vasquez already has set a school record for career 3-point attempts, now with 677, and for career field-goal attempts, now with 1,715.

Tough Schedule Once Again

• Maryland is facing its typically difficult schedule again this season. In this week's Associated Press poll, three Terrapin opponents in 2009-10 were ranked among the top 25 (#4 Duke, #10 Villanova, #13 Wisconsin)... Virginia Tech also received votes in the AP poll... Maryland's strength of schedule was ranked 21st in the nation on Tuesday by CollegeRPI.com.

The Venezuelan Sensation

Guard Greivis Vasquez enters his final season poised to become one of Maryland's top players in school history in terms of the breadth of his impact:

- He was named 2010 ACC PLAYER OF THE YEAR on Tuesday, becoming the 5th Terrapin ever to win the award and the first since Juan Dixon in 2002. It was the 6th time a Maryland player had earned the honor, as Len Bias won back-to-back in 1985 & '86. Albert King (1980) and Joe Smith (1995) are the others... Vasquez was a unanimous choice for FIRST TEAM ALL-ACC this season.

- A year ago, Vasquez led the Terps in minutes (34.6 mpg), FG (210), FGA (522), 3FG (64), 3FGA (198), FT (111), FTA (128), rebounds (5.5 rpg), assists (5.0 apg), steals (1.41 spg) and points (17.5 ppg)... He became the first Terrapin in recorded history to lead the team in points, rebounds and assists in a season... Team leaders date back in the media guide to 1970... He was also the 6th player in ACC history to accomplish that milestone.

- With 2,112 points and 754 assists, Vasquez leads all returning players in the ACC in those two categories... **HE HAS BECOME THE ONLY PLAYER IN ACC HISTORY TO RECORD 2,000 POINTS, 700 ASSISTS AND 600 REBOUNDS IN HIS CAREER.**

- Against #3 North Carolina on 2/21/09, Vasquez had one of the strongest games in school history... He became only the third Terrapin to record a triple-double, scoring a career-high 35 points, grabbing 11 rebounds and dishing out 10 assists... It was the first triple-double for the Terps since Derrick Lewis accomplished the feat with points, rebounds and blocks twice in 1987... Vasquez scored Maryland's first 16 points of the game against the Tar Heels and had 8 of the Terps' dozen points in overtime... His basket with 8 seconds left in regulation completed a rally that erased a 9-point deficit in the final 1:39... His 3-pointer with 1:16 left in overtime gave the Terps a lead they would never give up... Vasquez's previous career-high in points was 28.

- Against Fairfield this season, Vasquez became the 38th Terrapin to reach 500 rebounds in his career... He is the first Terrapin ever with 500 rebounds and 500 assists... At Duke, he became the 27th Terrapin in history with 600 career rebounds.

- Vasquez's 5.7 apg average ranks behind only all-time assists leader and current Portland TrailBlazer Steve Blake, who averaged 7.0 over his career... He is now 2nd in school history with 754... Blake finished with 972 from 2000-03.

- In the season-opener against Charleston Southern, Vasquez recorded 13 assists... He fell two shy of the single-game school record he shares with Terrell Stokes... He matched that season-high on 2/24 with 13 against Clemson, getting his 4th game of the season and the 13th of his career with double figures in assists.

- He currently is on Maryland career lists in points (3rd), assists (2nd), steals (8th), FG (6th), FGA (1st), 3FG (2nd), 3FGA (1st), FT (6th) and FTA (7th)... Against Georgia Tech, Vasquez became the 6th player in Maryland history to reach 2,000 points... After a game-high 23 points at Virginia on 3/6, he is 3rd with 2,112... He is 37 points away from Len Bias in 2nd (2,149, 1983-86).

- Vasquez is among ACC statistical leaders in points (2nd), FG% (10th), FT% (2nd), 3FG (2nd), assists (1st), steals (7th), assist-turnover ratio (4th) and minutes (7th).

- He is averaging 21.4 ppg in his last 25 games (all in double figures).

- He scored 20 points or more in seven straight games between 12/12/09 (Eastern Kentucky) and 1/12/10 (at Wake Forest) and his efforts against Winston-Salem State (12/22) and Florida Atlantic (12/27) earned him ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS FOR 12/28... Vasquez also was PLAYER OF THE WEEK for 2/8 after his double-double against UNC... He earned back-to-back PLAYER OF THE WEEK honors on 2/22 and 3/1, giving him four for the year.

- Vasquez is averaging 22.1 points in his last 22 games, with the first 7 in that stretch being the streak of games with at least 20 points.

- Vasquez is now 1st in the league in assists with a 6.3 apg mark (Ishmael Smith, Wake, 6.0 apg) and was 4th in the nation after last weekend... His 13 helpers and 15 points against Clemson gave him his 3rd double-double of the season and the 13th of his career.

- Vasquez led the Terps in points (23), rebounds (7) and assists (7) at FSU, marking the first time since Vasquez's triple-double last year vs. UNC that a Terrapin has led the team in those three categories in a game.

- Vasquez had 33 of his career-high 41 points after halftime in the double-overtime win at Virginia Tech (2/27)... He had 28 in the second half... It was the 5th 30-point game of his career.

- Vasquez scored 9 of his 20 points in the win over #4 Duke in the final 5:10.

- Vasquez has hit 34 consecutive free throws over the last four games.

- He is 10th in the ACC in career assists with 754, having just passed Phil Ford of UNC into 10th.

More From Milbourne

Landon Milbourne enters his senior season having gained a measure of versatility to his game after moving inside last year... His effort exemplified his leadership role on the team...

- Milbourne joined Vasquez as the only two Terps a year ago to start all 35 games.
- Milbourne was 2nd on the team in rebounding with a 5.3 rpg average last year.
- This season, against Charleston Southern, Milbourne led the Terps in scoring with 16 points, hitting 7 of 10 shots from the field... He also added seven rebounds, two blocks and four steals.
- Against UNH, Milbourne hit 9 of 15 from the floor en route to a career-high 24 points... He ranks 4th in the ACC with a .500 shooting percentage from the floor.
- He has moved into 12th on the career blocked shots list with 98... He is 2 blocks away from becoming the 12th Terp in history with 100 career blocks.
- Milbourne is 2nd on the team in scoring (12.4 ppg) and is 3rd in rebounding (4.9 rpg).

Hayes Continues Strong Play

Eric Hayes has been a steady influence throughout his first three years as a Terrapin... He comes into his senior year having played 100 games in his career and, with a 3-pointer late in regulation at Wake Forest, became the 48th Terrapin to reach the 1,000-point plateau:

- His best games of last season came at the end, when he averaged 15.2 ppg in five postseason games... He scored in double figures in 9 of the last 13 games (12.8 ppg) and in each of the last 5 games... His first two 20-point games of his career came at the ACC Tournament, where he scored a career-high 21 (5-for-6 3FG) against NC State and 20 in the semis against Duke... He earned 2nd team All-Tourney.
- His current .867 FT percentage would top the school's career list (Greg Manning, .858 from 1978-81)...
- Hayes is currently 4th on the career list of 3-pointers made with 189 and is 6th in 3-point attempts (469).
- He has a 3-pointer in 26 of the Terps' 30 games this year... His .452 shooting percentage behind the arc would lead the ACC, but he's 3 short of qualifying for the list... He's also hitting .500 from the floor and is hitting .863 from the foul line.
- Hayes is continuing his career-long trend of taking care of the ball, now with 116 assists and 48 turnovers (2.42 assist-turnover ratio, 2nd in the ACC, Jon Scheyer, Duke, 3.0)... He had a season-high 9 against Florida Atlantic (12/27) with just 1 turnover... Hayes had his first double-figure game in assists in the double-OT win at Virginia Tech, posting a double-double (also 12 points)... He is now 15th in the nation in assist-turnover ratio.
- Hayes has scored in double figures in 5 straight games (13.2 ppg), in 6 of his last 7 and 10 of his last dozen games.

Mosley Improving

Sophomore guard Sean Mosley has had an outstanding start to the new season. After working hard on the offensive part of his game in the summer, the dedication seems to be paying off:

- The first 20-plus point game of his career came in marquee fashion as he scored 26 against then-3rd-ranked Villanova... Mosley hit 11 of 14 shots from the floor and went 3-for-4 from behind the arc en route to the top scoring performance by a Terrapin to that point in the season.
- Mosley is now 4th on the team with a 10.8 points per game average, having scored in double figures in 17 games, including each of the last 4 (14.5 ppg).
- He's hitting .532 from the floor thus far this season, including a perfect 8-for-8 from the floor en route to a team-high 21 points against Longwood.
- Mosley went 6-for-8 from the floor, including 2-for-3 behind the arc, to score a team-high 20 points in the win over Clemson on 2/24... He scored Maryland's first 7 points of the game and had 12 points by halftime.
- Mosley improved his career-high in single-game assists from four to 10 vs. New Hampshire.
- After the first three games, he had 16 assists and no turnovers.
- Mosley is 2nd on the team in rebounding with a 5.3 rpg average... His career-high 13 boards at Wake Forest (6 offensive) were the most by a Maryland player this season at the time.
- Seth Davis of SI.com listed Mosley among his breakout sophomores in 2009-10.
- He has hit 19 consecutive FTs in a stretch going back to the Clemson game at home (2/24).

Attendance Continues to Soar

Attendance for Maryland basketball remains consistently strong on a national basis. For the past 10 seasons, the Terps have been ranked in the top 10 nationally in overall attendance, home and away.

Over the last seven years, the Terps have ranked at least 8th nationally in home attendance, which has skyrocketed to 2,127,133 - an average of 17,294 each time the Terps play in the Comcast Center.

- In 2007-08, Maryland ranked 6th in the nation as 341,050 watched 19 Terrapin basketball games, as the Terps played to 100 percent capacity for the second time in six seasons.

- In 2003-04, the Maryland basketball team finished fifth nationally in home attendance average for the second-straight season and records were once again shattered at the Terps' state-of-the-art Comcast Center. The Terrapins and their fans set new records for single-game attendance with 16 full sellouts as the Terps played to 100 percent capacity (17,950).

- In 2002-03, when the Terrapins first moved into the \$125-million, 17,950 seat Comcast Center, they shattered all previous attendance records set in storied Cole Field House.

Terps Rated No. 1 in Fan Support

University of Maryland students were rated best in the nation at supporting their intercollegiate sports teams, according to a 2005 survey by the *Princeton Review*. In its annual ranking list of its Top-20 colleges in a number of categories, the *Review* lists a number of extracurricular activities, including one titled "Students Pack the Stadiums." Maryland topped that list followed by Notre Dame, Florida, Penn State, North Carolina, Georgia, Gonzaga, Arizona, Tennessee and Texas.

Freshman on the Boards

Freshman forward Jordan Williams has made an immediate impact on the glass and on the team.

- WILLIAMS WAS VOTED THIS WEEK TO THE ACC ALL-ROOKIE TEAM, the first Maryland player to make that team since Steve Blake was selected in 2000.

- Williams leads the team and is 4th in the ACC in rebounds with an 8.3 rpg average and is the 2nd among freshmen on that list.

- Williams has led or tied for the team lead in rebounding in 22 of the Terps' 30 games.

- Williams holds 13 of the top 15 single-game efforts on the boards this year with 11 games in double figures... His 15 in the double-OT win at Virginia Tech were the most by a Terrapin this season... He has double figures in rebounds in 5 of his last 7 games (10.0 rpg).

- Williams had at least 5 rebounds in each of his first 15 games as a Terrapin and in 29 of 30 contests this year.

- Williams has scored 12.6 ppg in his last 7 games (3 in double figures), including 18 against Clemson and 15 against Duke... He's shooting .538 from the floor in his last 7 games.

- Williams is 3rd on the single-season rebounding list for Terrapin freshmen... Buck Williams holds the freshman mark with 323 in 1979... He is only the 3rd freshman to post at least 250 points and 250 rebounds as a Terrapin (Joe Smith, Buck Williams).

Great Guard Play

- Ball-handling has been a strength of the Terrapins this season... Maryland is 1st in the league in assists (16.6 apg), 3rd in turnover margin (+3.1) and 1st in assist-turnover ratio (1.40)... The Terps have had more assists than their opponents in 22 games this year.

- The Terrapins are also among the national leaders in each of those team categories (11th in assists per game, 12th in assist-turnover ratio and 28th in turnover margin) after last weekend.

- Maryland has had 10 or fewer turnovers in 11 contests this season, including a season-low 7 at NC State and only 11 in 50 minutes at Virginia Tech.

Working Overtime

Maryland is 48-48 all-time in overtime games... Maryland has played at least one overtime game in 16 of the last 18 seasons, including each of the last 8 years.

- Maryland's 89-74 OT win over Vermont (11/21/08) marked the largest winning margin in an overtime game for the Terps, who outscored the Catamounts 17-2, including the first 17 points of the extra session.

- Maryland is 25-17 in overtime games played at home, including a 6-0 mark at Comcast Center... The most recent OT win came on 2/27/10 in double overtime at Virginia Tech (104-100).

- The Terps are 17-17 in overtime games under Gary Williams.

- Maryland is 1-1 in overtime games this season, having lost at Wake Forest, 85-83, on 1/12/10 and won at Virginia Tech.

Adept at Long Range

Maryland has proven to be one of the nation's most proficient 3-point shooting teams since the rule was instituted in 1987.

- Maryland has made at least one 3-pointer in 385 consecutive games.
- Maryland has failed to make a 3-pointer just twice in the last 453 games.
- The last game the Terps failed to make a 3-pointer was 1/7/1999 when Maryland went 0-for-7 from 3-point range in a 71-66 win at Virginia.
- Since Gary Williams took over, Maryland has hit a 3-pointer in 668 of 675 games.
- Since the rule was instituted in 1987, Maryland has hit at least one three-pointer in 725 of 734 games.

- Maryland posted an 82-80 victory over No. 1 North Carolina on January 19, 2008.
- The Terps are tied for second place in NCAA history with 10 wins over No. 1-ranked teams.
- Maryland has won four of its last seven meetings against top-ranked teams.
- Maryland has defeated a No. 1-ranked opponent in four of the last eight seasons.
- Two of the Terps' last four wins over a top-ranked team have been against Duke.
- Head coach Gary Williams ranks T1st with Roy Williams among all active Division I coaches with seven career wins over a No. 1 team (6 at Maryland, 1 at Ohio State).
- The Terps have played 24 games vs. No. 1 teams dating back to 1953-54.

Home Sweet Home

Maryland has been a dominant home team over the years:

- The Terps are 820-287 (.741) all-time at home dating back to 1923-24.
- Maryland is 114-25 (.820) all-time at Comcast Center.
- The Terps are 269-60 (.817) at home under Gary Williams (155-35 at Cole Field House).
- Maryland is 168-30 (.849) at home the last 10-plus seasons (since 1998-99).
- Maryland has won 63 of its last 66 regular season non-conference games at Comcast Center under Williams.
- The Terps are 149-7 (.955) in regular season non-conference home games under Williams.
- Maryland is 73-17 (.811) in home-openers in College Park all-time, including a 33-game winning streak (last loss on 11/27/76 to Notre Dame, 80-79, OT)... The Terps did not play a home game in 1918-19.

Maryland in the ACC

Maryland begins its 57th season as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Terps were a charter member of the conference in 1953-54 after 30 years as a member of the Southern Conference.

- Against Virginia (1/20/09), Maryland became only the 3rd school in ACC history to post 400 league wins.
- The Terps are 418-398 (.512) all-time in ACC games.
- Maryland is 260-146 (.641) in ACC home games.
- Maryland is 152-242 (.386) in ACC away games.
- Under Gary Williams, Maryland is 185-148 (.556) in ACC play.
- Maryland is 114-53 (.680) at home in ACC games under Williams, including a 44-18 (.707) mark at Comcast Center.
- The Terps have captured three ACC Tournament Championships: 1958, 1984 and 2004.

Terps Sign Three Players for Fall 2010

Head Coach Gary Williams landed one of his best recruiting classes in recent memory during the early signing period when Ashton Pankey, Mychal Parker, and Terrell Stoglin signed National Letters of Intent to play basketball at Maryland.

The trio has the Terrapins' 2010 recruiting class among the top 20 in the nation, according to a number of national recruiting analysts. Rivals.com currently has Maryland's signing class ranked 15th in the nation, while ESPN.com has ranked the Maryland signing class at No. 19.

"All three players should have an immediate impact on our program," said Williams. "They have the maturity and ability to play at a high level."

All three signees are listed by analysts as outstanding prospects at the high-major level.

Pankey is a 6-foot-9 power forward from Bronx, N.Y., who plays at St. Anthony High School. He was ranked 36th in the nation among power forwards by Scout.com.

Parker is a 6-foot-6 small forward who plays for the Miller School in Crozet, Va. A four-star prospect by Rivals.com, he was ranked 13th nationally among shooting guards by ESPN.com.

Stoglin is a 6-foot-1 point guard from Tucson, Ariz. He averaged 27 points and seven assists a game as a junior at Santa Rita High School and is a two-time player of the year in the Tucson area. He is the 19th-ranked point guard in the nation by ESPN.com.

The threesome is slated to replace the three-player senior class which is on pace to graduate in the spring. Maryland's roster includes seniors Greivis Vasquez, Landon Milbourne and Eric Hayes, who are slated to graduate in the spring.

Fear the Turtle!

Maryland is one of the most consistent winning programs in the country following more than a decade of excellence:

- The Terps have averaged 23.0 wins per season the last 13 years, including eight consecutive 20-win seasons from 1996-2004.
- Maryland has 16 straight postseason appearances, including 11 consecutive trips to the NCAA TOURNAMENT from 1993-2004.
- The Terrapins have won at least two postseason games (ACC, NCAA, NIT) in 9 of the last 11 seasons, including a 3-2 mark last year.
- The Terps have advanced to the NCAA SWEET SIXTEEN 7 times in the last 16 years... The Terps are 9th nationally in the number of Sweet Sixteen appearances since 1994.
- Maryland made consecutive trips to the NCAA FINAL FOUR in 2001 and 2002 .
- The Terps captured the 2002 NCAA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP.
- The Terps captured the 2004 ACC TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIP.

Commitment To Education

Under Gary Williams, the Maryland basketball program continues to place a high priority on education and the personal growth of its student-athletes. Maryland has graduated eight of its last 10 seniors and all four current seniors are on track to earn their degrees this season.

Jerome Burney has been named the recipient of the LeFrak Scholarship Award. The scholarship represents an endowment established by the Samuel J. and Ethel LeFrak Foundation, and is awarded annually to three Maryland student-athletes who exhibit extraordinary athletic, leadership and scholarship abilities.

Many former Terps continue to work toward their degrees while continuing to pursue professional basketball opportunities. Keith Booth, a four-year starter and 1997 All-American, graduated in 2003 after pursuing a professional basketball career that included winning an NBA Championship in 1998, and is now one of Gary Williams' assistant coaches. Former Terps Calvin McCall, Laron Profit and Terrell Stokes are among the recent men's basketball players to earn degrees from the University of Maryland. Maryland student-athletes all work toward completion of their college degree with the assistance of the Academic Support and Career Development Unit.

Booth Named Terps' ACC Legend for 2010

Maryland assistant coach Keith Booth will be one of the players honored this March at the 2010 ACC Tournament Legends Brunch held in Greensboro, N.C.

Booth, who played for the Terrapins from 1994-97, was a third-team All-America selection in 1997 by both the Associated Press and the NABC, helped lead the Terrapins to an 82-44 four-year record and four NCAA Tournament appearances. Booth is still ranked ninth on the Maryland career scoring list with 1,776 points, sixth in rebounds and sixth in steals. He earned first-team All-ACC accolades in 1997 and third-team honors in 1995 and was a second-team All-ACC Tournament pick in 1997. A first-round draft pick by the Chicago Bulls in the 1997 NBA Draft, he played for the Bulls in 1998 when they captured the NBA World Championship. He rejoined Maryland as an assistant for Head Coach Gary Williams for the 2004-05 season.

Former Terps Coach Bud Millikan Dies

Bud Millikan, who coached men's basketball at the University of Maryland from 1950 to 1967, died recently at the age of 89.

Millikan coached for 17 seasons at Maryland and compiled a 243-182 (.572) record. The Terrapins reached the NCAA Elite Eight and won the Atlantic Coast Conference title in the 1957-58 season. That Terrapin team went 22-7 and finished sixth in the nation in the final rankings.

Williams played as a point guard for Millikan's Maryland varsity team from the 1964-65 season through 1966-67. Williams said Millikan's coaching style gave a number of his players the inspiration they needed to become successful coaches in their own right.

"He was my coach for all four years," said Williams, who noted that Millikan also played and learned under legendary Hall of Fame coach Dr. Henry Iba. "I think his strength was he was a very strict fundamentals coach. That was an important part of a number of us becoming head coaches."

Williams noted that players like Billy Jones (UMBC), Joe Harrington (Hofstra, George Mason, Long Beach State, Colorado), Terry Truax (Towson) and Billy Franklin (Bowie HS) were all head-coaching products of Millikan's program.

"To have that many coaches come off one team shows that if you listened, you picked up a lot of good things," said Williams. "He was a tough coach and if you wanted to play, you did things his way. He was a great person."

Millikan, who also was the coach when Billy Jones became the first African-American player to play basketball in the ACC, was inducted to the University of Maryland Athletics Hall of Fame in 1988.

ACC Tournament Fast Facts

- The only time that four players on one team scored 20 or more points in an ACC Tournament game: John Lucas (24), Owen Brown (22), Mo Howard (20) and Tom McMillen (20) scored 86 of Maryland's 105 points in the Terps' 105-85 semifinal victory over North Carolina in 1974.
- The 2004 Maryland basketball team captured the ACC Title, winning the conference tournament for the third time in history and the first time since 1984. The Terrapins defeated No. 3 seed Wake Forest (87-86), No. 2 seed NC State (85-82) and No. 1 seed Duke (95-87 (OT)) to mark the third time in ACC Tournament history that a team has knocked off the top three seeds.
- John Gilchrist was named the 2004 ACC Tournament MVP, becoming the first Terrapin to earn that distinction since Len Bias in 1984. He averaged 24.0 points, 6.3 assists, 5.3 rebounds and 2.0 steals across the three ACC tournament games, including a 30-point, seven-assist, four-rebound, four-steal performance in Maryland's comeback victory over NC State in the semifinal round.
